More than a drop in the bucket

Pov still smiles every time she walks the 20 steps to her new well. Every bucket of clean water she pumps reminds her that clean water continues to be the foundation of everything her family accomplishes. The water nourishes flourishing vegetable gardens that feed her family and provide reliable income year-round. The water is why her children are not sick and can attend school daily. Chaun, her husband, does not have to cut wood deep in the jungle for the benefit of others. Pov does not have to walk six kilometres a day to collect water in addition to toiling on a big plantation that paid her close to nothing. Clean water and Pov's determination are why her family is leaving poverty behind. They are making their dream of better days come true every day.



The first 30 days

Families start recovering from sickness and begin protecting their health once access to clean water, proper sanitation and health training is in place. Time to access water is now just minutes instead of 4+ hours a day.

Around 6 months

Good health is the norm. Time that used to be spent collecting water is invested to create opportunities, like starting a business. Children are in school. Irrigation is supporting

One year onward

Self-sufficiency is close. Families are growing their confidence as they expand their farms and businesses. Seeing their parents success, children are making plans

The end was the beginning

Looking out over her ever-expanding fish pond and farming enterprise, Dobolo remembers the moment she chose to be stronger than her problems. Dobolo's husband had died. There was no income to support her and her two children. The land she had farmed was gone as well. Dobolo's journey out of a desperate situation started when she joined a community of fish farmers. With training and support, Dobolo soon raised Tilapia fish in her first hand-dug pond. Within a year, Dobolo's success generated food for her family and enough excess income to purchase her another parcel of land, where she dug more fish ponds. Determined to ensure her family will never experience poverty again, Dobolo re-invested profits into farmland, where she raises goats, pigs, and cattle. A single choice to not let poverty define her life changed everything.

Some crops are emerging, others are ready for harvest. Growing practices continue to improve using training and supports like greenhouses and safe storage.

One vear onward

Families are food-secure. Crops are narvested twice yearly, vegetables multiple times. The surplus harvest is generating income. The soil and water table continue to improve,

New business, new life

Samanthi saw something special in the little white tubes poking out of the soil — a way out of the poverty. She told everyone, including local mushroom expert Sunil Rajapakse, about her idea and how it would create better days for her family. Moved by her determination and vision, Sunil taught Samanthi to cultivate the popular mushrooms on a large scale. With new skills in hand and a start-up loan, Samanthi's mushroom growing operation came to life with 2,000 mushroom pots. Within a month, her business was turning a profit. It was clear this enterprising entrepreneur was transforming her family's circumstances. The hardships they endured because of unreliable income were behind them. Confident in her abilities and success, Samanthi has grown her business to 10,000 pots, with more to come.

The first 30 days

Samanthi, Sri Lanka

Self-Help Groups help women learn how to start and run businesses as well as how to use and save money. Women are supported in developing business plans and their family's pathway out of poverty.

Around 6 months

Income and opportunities start flowing within weeks of receiving small loans to start businesses. Initial loans get repaid. Businesses start to grow. Families begin saving money for schooling and all their needs.

One year onward

Now self-reliant and confident, women grow their businesses and participate fully in the local economy. Many take on more responsibility for decision -making in their homes and communities.



The first 1 - 2 years

Clean water is available within minutes of people's homes and waterborne disease eradicated through water systems designed and built by communities.

Chronic hunger is overcome, incomes begin to rise and the soil and water table are returning to a resilient state through sustainable agricultural initiatives

Women begin to help lead their families and communities out of poverty as they apply the training, loans and support received through community-based Self-Help Groups. Their businesses generate enough income to meet their immediate needs and education for their children.

3 - 5 years and beyond

Good health, hygiene and sanitation are the norm, supporting further gains in family self-sufficiency and community well-being.

Sustainable agriculture is resilient and expanding, contributing significantly to family incomes, food security and the local economy.

Families are benefitting from full participation in local economies and community decision-making. Their small businesses continue to grow, enabling even higher levels of savings and a wider range of new opportunities.

Investing in people and their pathway out of poverty

Extreme poverty ends through compassion for families and investments in community-driven approaches that build dreams, equip households and develop resiliency.

When aspirations are paired with resources and determination, lives transform. People facing much need pursue possibility, shape their local economies, foster a life outside of extreme poverty and contribute to the well-being of their communities.

To you, our partners and the families we all help move toward better days.

Funding commitments to overseas partners increased in 2021 as HOPF focused on supporting new programming.

2021 was a unique year for HOPE finances. Monetary contributions to the organization returned to pre-pandemic (2019) levels. Goods in Kind contributions from our medical partners remained low, and were approximately 45% lower than 2020.






